

Veterans Day



The Highground held its Veterans Day ceremony on November 11th. The names of the 1,244 Wisconsin KIAs/MIAs in the Vietnam War, 877 names of the Wisconsin KIAs/MIAs in the Korean War and the name of Daniel Busch, killed in Mogadishu, were honorably read on the plaza by John Myers (Eau Claire), Skip Klabon (Colby) Louie Kessler (Neillsville), Hiram Cutting (Watertown), and Jerry Feeney (Eau Claire).

Eight members of the Neillsville High School choir sang the Star-Spangled Banner. Kay Anason, Highground Donations Coordinator, emceed the program.

A Highground Board member, C.W. King, welcomed the crowd and introduced guest speaker, Kari Porter, Counselor at LaCrosse Vet Center. Kari has been a member of the Wisconsin National Guard for almost 18 years with two deployments in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. She spoke about the struggles many veterans of present-day conflicts are facing as they return to civilian life and how veterans' programs and community support is an indispensable ally for today's veterans.

The names of the Wisconsin service men and women who have died in the Persian Gulf conflicts were solemnly read aloud,

accompanied by the tolling of the Liberty Bell and presentation of colors by the American Legion color guards. Following the reading, "Taps" was performed by John Hofmann of Marshfield, a student at the University of Wisconsin Marshfield Center.

Persian Gulf veterans and family members of those killed in the Persian Gulf were able to sign the base of the Wisconsin Persian Gulf Tribute, which is under construction.





Military Dog Care During Vietnam War

Military working dogs are given tremendous veterinary care and treatment. Blood samples are drawn monthly to test for



viruses, heart worm and other local blood conditions. Because of the amount of parasites and insects in tropical climates the dogs receive a monthly bath in a diluted solution that contains malathion.

This is not something they enjoy. Twice a year the dogs are put under a temporary anesthetic so that their teeth can be cleaned of plaque and tartar buildup. Dogs are fed a soft diet and commercially canned dog meat but are not allowed to chew on bones or other hard objects that would clean their teeth naturally. This is done to minimize any possible medical issues that would arise with chewing on hard objects.


Boy Scout Eagle Project






Dear Highground, Mr. Norm Poppe

Civil War Tribute October & November





Art; so much more than just "pretty" November-January



Twenty veterans from all over Wisconsin had their talents on display at The Highground Learning Center. Everything; from the beauty of the written word, stunning stained glass pieces, dramatic paintings, drawings and prints, intricately detailed model planes, trucks, and tanks to several forms of woodworking. These works were all done by Korean, Vietnam, Persian Gulf, Iraq or Afghanistan veterans. Some of them have always had a given talent for what they do, some picked

up a form of art as a pastime, while others found it to be part of their saving grace. The arts; no matter what form,

can be a healer, up-lifter and strengthener of our minds, bodies and spirits.

As part of The Highground's mission of healing and education, an open house was held December 14, 2013, where three veterans were on site demonstrating their talents to the public.

Veteran, James "Jim" Hoefler of Watertown, WI is a woodcarver. He began carving in 1991, and is now holding classes to teach others how this craft is done. Jim has a way of showing you how it is done, but also somehow teaches you how

to put your "feelings" into it.

One of our volunteers and a Vietnam veteran, **Hiram Cutting**; also of Watertown, WI is a woodcarving hobbyist and one of Jim's students. Hiram started woodcarving about 12 years ago and says that it is so relaxing and is such a good stress reliever, that he finds himself working on his carvings almost daily. Hiram works a lot with Basswood as it is a light wood that is easy to carve, especially the intricate details of facial features.

Local artist and veteran, **Wendell Ziegler** of Neillsville, started "turning" wood on a lathe as a hobby. He states that he can start turning a piece of wood with one

idea in mind and then "the unexpected beauty that you find causes you to change your mind so you can save that beauty". Wendell turns everything from toy tops to elaborate vases and bowls.

Other artist's on display included:, Castanie – Drawing, Danno – Drawing, Dave Dvorachek – Poetry, Kirk Rodman – Stained Glass, Frank Thomas – Drawing, Patrick Loftesnes – Print work, Tom Miller – Drawing/ Painting, William Phillips – Painting, Marathon Venture Academy Students – Sculptures (done for our veterans), and 8 others that would like to remain anonymous.



Many events center around and feature those who gave their all and express our undying gratitude for their service; but those that came back also deserve our thanks and appreciation—help us welcome these soldiers home too.






