





# 25th Anniversary of Wisconsin's Vietnam Veterans' Tribute, "Fragments"

Saturday, September 14<sup>th</sup> marked the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Wisconsin's Vietnam Veterans' Tribute, known as "Fragments". This has become a destination for veterans and loved ones of those who were lost in Vietnam. Approximately one thousand people came together to show their support of Vietnam veterans and re-dedicate the tribute.

At noon, color guards from the Wausau VVA #479, Plover American Legion VFW #10262, Boyd American Legion #326, American Legion #0291, Augusta VFW #8478, Michael Voth VVA Chapter 5, Mattoon American Legion #287 and the Pala Veterans from the Pala Band Mission Indians from California accompanied





several Vietnam veterans as they honorably read aloud the names of the 1,244 Wisconsinites that were killed or missing in action during the Vietnam War.

At 2pm, these nine color guard units presented flags to begin the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and Re-dedication ceremony of "Fragments". The National Anthem was led by musical group "Vets for Freedom". Chaplain James Seim, who had served as a chaplain in Vietnam, led the ceremony with a powerful invocation. He expressed how, even as


we

our own lives, we have still taken pause to honor, remember and reflect on "that company of comrades from Wisconsin who have offered their lives, who have made living sacrifices of all their hopes and dreams, their talents and gifts, all that they had to share with fellow citizens for our sakes."



Kirk Rodman, VGM, presented the guest speakers, Howard Sherpe, Steve Piotrowski, and Don Quicker, who were all instrumental in the development of The Highground. Robert Kanyusik, "Fragments" sculptor, spoke about the physical formation of the statuary and how he strove to achieve a precise reflective, emotional and healing essence in the solid tribute.

At the close of the ceremony, the names of all Wisconsin KIAs of the Persian Gulf region, Iraq, Afghanistan, and





Many exhibits pertaining to "Fragments", Vietnam and the Vietnam War were on display at The Highground, including a 480 square foot map of the area in which the Vietnam War was

fought. Vietnam veterans were able to sign on the regions where they had served. Friends and family of those who were lost in Vietnam, or who have since passed, were also able to sign where their loved ones had fought and served.


Vietnam Veterans searching through blocks with the names of Vietnam KIA/MIAs

# 13th Annual Ride to Remember Motorcycle Rally raises \$15,000

The 13<sup>th</sup> Annual Highground Ride to Remember Rally took place on Friday and Saturday, Aug. 16th- 17<sup>th</sup>, and was dedicated to "Women in Service and Support". Friday night's program at The Highground was led with a presentation of colors by Neillsville Boy Scout Troop #43. Tom Barten led those present for the program in the singing of *The Star Spangled Banner*. Kirk Rodman, Volunteer General Manager, welcomed the Friday night crowd and introduced guest speaker, **Ann Schueller**.





Ann, a veteran with 21 years of service, gave a heartfelt speech recounting her military service as well as her experience being the support figure while her husband and two sons served deployments. Ann leads a job seekers group at Fox Valley Technical College. Her work allows her to help veterans, some of which just recently returned from deployment, adjust to their civilian life, create resumes and find employment.

On Saturday, over 175 riders registered for the Ride to Remember at the WCCN pavilion and went on guided rides. At 3pm, the motorcyclists gathered

together and began an impressive procession to the park. Welcoming the bikers into The Highground were a color guard from the Greenwood American Legion Post 238, members of Neillsville Boy Scout Troop #43, Menomonie Boy Scout Troop #1701 and many members of the community.

# Diversity Day at The Highground —September 24, 2013

Two hundred forty students from five schools attended Diversity Day. Elementary and Middle School students from Pittsville, Maple Grove, Amherst, Neillsville and Immanuel Lutheran attended many interesting and exciting presentations plus guided tours of The Highground during their day-long program.

David Koch, a Resource Counselor from the Center for Independent Living in Western Wisconsin based in Menomonie, let the students feel what it is like to live with a handicap or disability. Through various props and limiting what students were able to use, the students experienced how those who have lost or impaired use of limbs, sight or other life-changing challenges must adapt to cope with everyday life.



Henry Smith, of Greenwood, brought wood carving to life as he explained the art of carving in The Highground's new educational pavilion. Students learned many things about carving, nature and what "diamond willow" looks like!

The Mississippi Valley Archaeology Center (MVAC) from the UW-La Crosse was represented by Jean Dowiasch. Jean brought an exciting display of what Wisconsin was like during the Ice Age and other times in our pre-American past. Students were able to handle replica mammoth teeth and other items to imagine what our hometowns looked like, what animals roamed the area and how the people of that age lived their daily lives. They were also able to learn how

archaeologists are able to use clues, such as the size of deer teeth found at ancient human sites, to determine in what conditions the people were living.

A musical presentation that was both fun and educational was brought to The Highground by Joan Johannes. Joan brought with her enough "hands-on" wood instruments so that each student was able to take part in creating and performing a group song. She also taught the lesson that it's



okay to be different as long as you respect the rights of others. Her message was to "celebrate our sameness, but also our diversity".

Cummins Filtration returned to Diversity Day this year with a team to celebrate diversity across the globe. They gave a history and explained the cultures that are found in China and India. At the end of their presentation, students were given the opportunity to have their names written in Hindi and/or Chinese.





death, I am certain his spirit was with us and he is proud to be honored. Thank you again for the impressive ceremony.



# Persian Gulf update

The "Bootprint" is finally taking shape. This past August, the foundations were finally laid, and the electrical wiring installed. Work continues on this phase I of the construction.

Phase II is the manufacture and installation of the statuary. This is where the bulk of the fundraising is required, and in order to complete this phase, we'll need a concerted effort to bring the Persian Gulf Tribute to fruition.

As a reminder, this tribute includes the period of the Persian Gulf War back in 1991/1992. For those who may wonder why the American military men and women answer the call to serve our great country and her ideals, here's an excerpt from a Navy deployment cruise book from back then that captures the best of what America is:





There was little food. Fresh stream water quickly became stagnant. Diarrhea led to dehydration, and death for many. Instead of digging plots to feed the communities, mass grave plots were sprinkled in the mountainsides at each camp.

"We couldn't get supplies fast enough to handle the mass of patients at our tent each morning." one French doctor said. If refugees stayed in the camps, there would be more graves. Cholera and dysentery were calling. The Turkish border guards refused to answer the refugees' pleas for help, wary of their own Kurdish population.

Hussein said, "...come home, all will be forgotten." But the Kurds had heard this before. At least they had a chance in the mountains. There were no gas attacks and no helicopter gunships strafing innocent civilians.

Then large, green helicopters with different markings began to land. And out the back came food and water, not soldiers. The Marines earned a new nickname, "Feeding Soldiers."

You see, after the shooting stops, peace needs to be restored. American military men and women have answered the peace call in the past and continue to answer that call today in lands far from home. The Persian Gulf War is over 20 years past and may be overshadowed by the recent conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan, but for those who served there, the Persian Gulf War is still fresh in our minds. And to those of us who were part of the humanitarian relief efforts, it makes me proud to be called an American, and I feel privileged to have served this fine nation in both the Persian Gulf War as well as in Iraq.

The Persian Gulf Tribute is taking shape and will soon take its place alongside the wonderful tributes to our veterans of past wars. The "Bootprint" should remind us all of the impressions we left on the hearts and minds of those we helped.




