### THE HIGHGROUND'S VETERANS DAY CEREMONY



The rain didn't dampen spirits on Veterans Day, but it did cause most of The Highground Veterans Day Ceremony to be moved inside to the Learning Center! Approximately fifty guests attended the inspiring, and at times emotional, ceremony. Guest speaker, Command Sgt Major Jeffrey E. Uhlig from Fort McCoy spoke eloquently of the service of veterans, "It's important that we do honor our veterans because they're



what made us strong, they are what's going to be carrying us into the future." Sgt. Uhlig also recognized the "silent killer", post-traumatic stress disorder, which affects many soldiers returning from combat.



The cold rain did not stop a few hardy volunteers who stood in front of the Liberty Bell and read the names of Wisconsin's KIA's and MIA's from the conflicts in Korea. Vietnam, Gulf War, Iraq, and Afghanistan. The names of those killed at Fort Hood were also read.

Other highlights of the service included the Presentation of Colors by the Loyal American Legion 175, The "Star-Spangled Banner" led by the Granton Fall Festival Court, poetry by John Myers and "Taps" by Robert Labarbera.





# Military Dog/Dog Handler Tribute



The committee working to build a Military Dog and Handler Memorial at The Highground needs your assistance. This memorial will honor the service of Military Dogs (Scout, Sentry and Tracker) and their handlers. It will be designed with Vietnam era camo, equipment, and German Shepherd Dog or Dogs. They have been an integral part of our Military for 100 years and their use has been expanded in recent times. The Seal Team 6 operation that removed Osama Bin Laden had a service dog (Cairo) that was an integral part of their mission. Dogs have a heightened sense of sight, hearing and smell that make them extremely valuable to the soldiers.

In Iraq and Afghanistan, dogs are used to identify IED's and other forms of weaponry. In Vietnam, Scout dogs (guard) served with the point soldier for patrols working in the jungles. Their keen

senses were invaluable to our troops. Sentry Dogs (attack dogs) were used to guard Michael Olson's dog critical sites, ammunition dumps, perimeters, etc. These dogs, working only at night, protected the camps and vital military sites. Tracker dogs (labs, cross breeds) were used to track the enemy once contact with them had been broken. Similar to a blood hound they followed the scent trail of the enemy. # What Kind of Legacy Will You Leave?—Kirk Rodman, Vol. Gen Mgr



or too small for us to accomplish.



LaCrosse, Lone Rock and Milwaukee, Wisconsin Veterans, as well as many others from across the United States.





# Fighting for Democracy Exhibit

Is history repeating itself or have things never really changed? During the *Fighting for Democracy* exhibit, displayed November and December in the Learning Center, over 600 students and 200 adult visitors contemplated this question. The exhibit told the life stories of seven Americans from diverse backgrounds. It taught us about their struggles and accomplishments and the changes that came about in our country because of their actions.



Pepin, Black River Falls, Pittsville, and Neillsville schools brought their students for multiple day lessons on democracy, discrimination, perseverance and achieving their dreams. Students participated in several activities, including slideshow and booklet for their pre-WWII research, a video section was used for portraying their lives during WWII, iPads were used for the post-WWII research and all students participated in group projects.

The students and adults alike learned that prior to and during WWII if you were from a different ethnic background, even if you and your whole family were born in the United States, you suffered discrimination, ridicule, exclusion and some forms of physical retribution. They also learned from these seven individuals that you should always stand up for what you believe in, never give up on your dreams, and always strive to make this a better

place for ALL to live.

Another observation that was gleaned from this exhibit was that there is still much discrimination, ridicule, exclusion and physical retribution going on today. We may not hang signs everywhere or have segregated schools, busses or drinking fountains, but it is thriving in different forms such as bullying, cliques and now, with the internet, cyber-hate is out of control. Students drafted plans of action they will take to personally help stop this vicious cycle and to ensure democracy and equality for themselves and future generations.




