

sure if it is not part of the exhibit, it did not exist.


This exhibit has something for everyone of all ages. It is a great place to bring the family to share the story of your service. It is one






Veterans Day Activities at The Highground

The Highground recognized Veterans Day throughout the day on Friday, November 11th. At Noon, the names of the 1,244 Wisconsin KIAs/MIAs in the Vietnam War and 877 names of the Wisconsin KIAs/MIAs in the Korean War were read and honored with the tolling of the Liberty Bell.

The 3:00pm ceremony was held on The Highground Plaza. Sunny skies and warm temperatures greeted the crowd of over 125 people to the outdoor program. The Loyal American Legion #175 and Thorp VFW #9057 opened the ceremony with their color guards. Students from Rural Virtual Academy rang the Liberty Bell and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Neillsville High School choir members sang the Star Spangled Banner. An invocation was presented by Terri Giles.


Kirk Rodman, Volunteer General Manager of The Highground, welcomed attendees to the ceremony and introduced guest speaker, Lt. Col. Arieyeh J. Austin.

Lt. Col. Austin is Battalion Commander, 1st Battalion, 310th Infantry Regiment, 181st Infantry Brigade at Fort McCoy. He entered military service in 1997. He has been deployed to Bosnia in support of Operation Joint Guard (1998); Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom (2003); and Afghanistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom (2011 and 2013). He spoke of how military veterans and those in the military today are among the most dedicated of all generations. He asked those present to watch and listen when a veteran says the Pledge of Allegiance or sings the Star Spangled Banner. Austin said that these words "are alive" when spoken or sung by a veteran.

A poem was read by two young students from Rural Virtual Academy. They had written the poem for The Highground's Veterans Day ceremony. The names of the Wisconsin service men and women who have died in the Persian Gulf conflicts, including Iraq and Afghanistan, and others were read near the conclusion of the program, accompanied by a rifle salute and "Taps".

Recognition of Veterans was held at the close of the ceremony to give all attendees an opportunity to extend their thanks and gratitude to the veterans present.

Wisconsin Department of Corrections Holds Veterans Recognition Ceremony at The Highground



The Highground was honored to host the Wisconsin Department of Corrections Veterans Recognitions Ceremony on Monday, November 7th. Reed Richardson, Stanley Correctional Institution warden, gave the opening welcome. The Wisconsin National Guard Color Guard and Loyal American Legion Post #175 were present with color guards. Myron Olson, Jackson Correctional Institution chaplain, led the ceremony with a prayer for

veterans. Sandy Hautamaki, Gold Star mother and Deputy Warden at Redgranite Correctional Institution, sang the National Anthem. Kirk Rodman, Volunteer General Manager of The Highground, welcomed those in attendance to The Highground.

Honored guest speakers were Jon Litscher, Secretary of the WI Dept of Corrections; Steven Ligler, Staff Developmental Director of the Dept of Corrections; and Col. Galen White, WIARNG Deputy Chief of Staff, Logistics/G4.

The Wisconsin service men and women who have died while fighting in the Persian Gulf area (Desert Storm, Iraq and Afghanistan) and others were remembered. These fallen service members' names were read by Buffy Moncel, Staff Sergeant in the US Air Force and Andrew Fellows, Corporal in the US Marine Corps. The Loyal American Legion followed the reading with a rifle salute. "Taps" was performed by Dan Winkleski, Deputy Warden at the WI Secure Program Facility and Duane Konkel, Bureau of Technology Management of the Wisconsin Dept. of Corrections.

In addition to attending the Veterans Recognition Ceremony, many Department of Corrections employees donated winter clothing to The Highground's clothing drive for homeless veterans. 15 boxes of new (MANY new items were made by programs at the correctional institutions) and gently used items were brought to The

Highground with more to come as of the date of this printing. More information about this clothing drive is on page 15—help us if you can.

Those attending the ceremony were served a lunch provided by two of the DOC facilities at the Neillsville American Legion Post #73 afterwards. The DOC extends their thanks to Post #73 for their hospitality and service.







LeRoy Stelzer Honored at Greenwood School on Veterans Day

To honor a veteran in a new way for the Greenwood School District accepted nominations of a veteran. Then fundraising was completed and a Legacy Stone was purchased to be presented to 2016's Veteran honoree, LeRoy Stelzer. When Scott Moseley, teacher, discussed veteran services and the possibility of honoring a veteran with this gift to his sixth grade students many of them were interested in participating, making it a reality. They were asked to write an essay on why they wanted to present the Legacy Stone and what it would mean to them. All of the student's responses were very reflective and well thought out. Jaylinn Artac was chosen to present Mr. Stelzer with his Legacy Stone. Jaylinn's essay spoke about how many of her relatives are veterans and has heard the difficulties and sacrifices they went through and felt bad for them. She talked about it being a way for her to show appreciation to a veteran.



Greenwood School students and teachers took the initiative to recognize veterans for the contributions and sacrifices they made while serving their country in the military. The first annual presentation of a Legacy Stone to a local veteran. It will proudly be on display in the trophy case at the school until The Highground dedication May 13, 2017. Mosely told the audience at the school, "This legacy stone is more than just a stone brick with an inscription. It represents years of service to a country loved deeply by the veteran as well as many sacrifices which may include missing important family events such as birthdays, anniversaries, weddings, and even missing the birth of a child. Unfortunately, the legacy stone may also represent sacrifices such as injuries sustained while serving during times of war or even death."

LeRoy served in the National Guard and Reserves from 1976 to 2002 for a total of 26 years. He was trained as a heavy equipment operator which included operating bulldozers and scrapers. If called upon in a time of war his role was to run this heavy equipment to create a road system and base for the troops. He was also trained as a combat engineer whose responsibility was to be the first to enter an area of conflict and secure the location. In 1987, LeRoy was transferred to the reserves where he instructed soldiers in leadership skills and became a trainer for operating heavy equipment. This is when LeRoy stated that he hit his stride. LeRoy said that his experiences as an elementary teacher at Greenwood Elementary School prepared him to train young men to run heavy equipment. In 1992, LeRoy became a Course Manager at Fort McCoy, Green Bay, and Milwaukee. In this capacity, he was responsible for supervising the instructors that taught the soldiers in a division titled 88 Mike. This transportation division trained soldiers how to run and maintain the large military vehicles safely during convoys.

The military assignments tell the history of LeRoy's service but they do not tell the whole story. "LeRoy was very committed and passionate about serving his country. First of all, he mentioned that it really bothered him that some of the soldiers he trained may not come back alive from their missions. He stated that he hoped that he provided all of the soldiers with quality training so they would be prepared to do their jobs safely in a time of conflict."

Thank you Mr. Stelzer for your service to this country and congratulations on being the first recipient of this well-deserved honor. A special thanks also to Moseley's sixth grade class for organizing the fundraiser to raise money to purchase the legacy stone. You have set the bar high for others to follow suit. These Greenwood Students have inspired the Neillsville High School students to organize its own fundraisers to help with the cost of a legacy stone for a veteran. This really shows the commitment of our students to honor local veterans.

Fifth Grade Education Days, by Joan Chwala

On Tuesday, October 4th and Wednesday, October 5th, nearly 750 fifth grade students from sixteen schools were treated to a field trip to The Highground. Tuesday was a beautiful fall day, with the foliage sporting multiple colors, making the conditions ideal for groups to rotate through the various stations. At each stop, they learned about the memorials, rang the liberty bell, or saw the library and displays in the Learning Center. At the Dove Effigy Mound, those who brought soil from home were allowed to let it rest and become one with Mother Earth at The Highground. Several American Legion Family members explained veterans service organizations and demonstrated the meaning of each fold during a cemetery flag folding ceremony that accompanies military honors at the funeral for a veteran. Volunteers were asked to role play the grieving family during the demonstration.

Wednesday morning was a totally different story with rain causing the guides to move to "Plan B" which included the use of the garage for the flag folding and portable tents to lecture about each tribute. These students got a taste of the life of a soldier and how it would require them to brave the elements, even in adverse weather conditions.

Diversity Day



Approximately 300 students from six schools attended Diversity Days at The Highground on September 27th and 28th. Elementary and Middle School students from Pittsville, Maple Grove, Amherst, Neillsville, Falcon Academy and Auburndale were able to experience several presentations highlighting cultural differences.

David Koch, a Resource Counselor from the Center for Independent Living in Western Wisconsin based in Menomonie brought a display that let the students feel what it is like to live with a handicap or disability. Henry Smith of Greenwood brought wood carving to life, combining a presentation of the artistic skill with other information on carving and nature. Students were able to try their hand with one of the wood working tools.

Flag history and etiquette were presented by the Ah Dah Wa Gam Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution from Wisconsin Rapids. The chapter performed a flag retirement ceremony, ceremonially burning with honor a United States flag which was beyond repair.

Diversity Days will be held September 26-27, 2017.


