Ted Fetting passed away on April 1st after his battle with brain cancer. Ted had volunteered to serve in the Army to eliminate his younger brother from being eligible for the draft. Serving with the 9th Infantry, he distinguished himself as a machine gunner during Tet. As with many of us, the Vietnam War was the defining experience of Ted's life. Upon returning to the states, he became a lifelong advocate for veterans. He served in many positions, and on many committees to better the lives of veterans. Anybody who knew Ted knew that to him, the best interests of his fellow veterans always came

We would also love to work with schools! Last year Greenwood School had a stone presented to a veteran by students during their Veterans Day Program. It was well received, appreciated and students learned a lot about veterans in their area.

Long Shadow: The Vietnam Series —June - August

When another generation of American soldiers was sent to invade a distant nation at the start of the Gulf War in 1991, I began work on the *Long Shadow* series of paintings by examining hundreds of photographs I took in 1965-66 as a combat journalist with the 1st Infantry Division during the war in Viet Nam. Images in the paintings refer to the photos. For each painting I've also chosen excerpts from a journal I kept during the war. I completed the sixth canvas in the *Long Shadow* series in 2013.

My hope was to illustrate with paint my dismal, frightening, and emotional memories of war. I didn't anticipate the unexpected impressions of bloody explosions, violence, and loneliness that the work brought forth.

As a veteran, I'm lucky to work as an artist. Visual art is a peaceful outlet for the inner residue of war. Along with art, the love and support of family and friends, activism for peace and justice, a spiritual path, living in the country, and writing have come together to make life precious beyond words.

Not a single day has passed in 50 years when I am not aware of some aspect—a detail—of the war in Viet Nam. Every war, past, present, and yet to come, casts a shadow of trauma. Veterans return home with a long shadow permanently attached to their psyches, and the shadow is cast onto their families, friends, and communities. An antidote to the contagion of war is peace. But the peaceful cure is preempted when young people are sent to another war, which will truly end only with the death of its final survivor.

I'm grateful to The Highground for hosting this exhibition of paintings and photos. The exhibit is dedicated to my late friend, Viet Nam medic and veteran, artist, and writer Howard Sherpe. He was a co-founder of The Highground and consistently supported my work as an artist. When I submitted my design for the dove mound in 1985, Howard encouraged the idea and helped lead it to completion in 1989. Howard was a skilled artist and writer, always humble and kind. I thank him.

Long Shadow is a series of six mural-sized acrylic paintings on canvas accompanied by photos I took during the war, and excerpts from my war journal. I also collected a soundtrack of music important to me during the war era. —David Giffey







David Giffey Bio: Giffey grew up on a family dairy farm in Lamartine Township, Fond du Lac County. He was drafted in 1964 while working as wire editor of a daily newspaper in Oshkosh. After conscription, he was trained as a 105mm Howitzer gunner at Fort Riley, Kansas, and re-assigned as a combat journalist and editor with the U.S. Army 1st Infantry Division during the American war in Viet Nam. Giffey was discharged from active duty in 1966, returning to Wisconsin to work as a civilian journalist and photographer. As a veteran, he was a peace activist and helped organize the 1969 Viet Nam War Moratorium in Oshkosh in 1969.

For the past 50 years Giffey worked as an artist, journalist, and photographer. He didn't study art formally, and began his visual art career as a street vendor in Austin, Texas, in 1971. Major visual art projects include icons and murals in Greek Orthodox churches, community centers, schools, and public buildings in Wisconsin, Illinois, Minnesota, and Greece, as well as a series of paintings based on his experiences in the Vietnam War. Hundreds of his easel paintings are owned by or were commissioned for private and public collections. He designed and supervised construction of the Mourning Dove Effigy Mound at the Highground Veterans Memorial Park in Clark County.

Publications include: Long Shadows: Veterans Paths to Peace (2006 - Atwood Publishing) with foreword by Howard Zinn; Struggle for Justice: The Migrant Farm Worker Labor Movement in Wisconsin, (1998) a chronicle of Wisconsin and Texas co-authored with Jesús Salas; and The People's Stories of South Madison, (2001) edited oral histories with elders of the African American community in Madison, Wisconsin. The publications include Giffey's photographic and painted illustrations.

From 2005-2012, Giffey edited the Home News weekly newspaper, Spring Green. His weekly columns won a 2008 Wisconsin Newspaper Association first place award and Golden Dozen Awards in 2010 and 2012 from the International Society of Weekly Newspaper Editors.

Giffey is an active member of Veterans for Peace Chapter 25. He lives in rural Iowa County with his wife Nancy, an artist.

Jeffrey Stenbom's Glass Sculptors- "Window to a Veterans Soul" -Sept - Nov



The Highround's Learning Center will be displaying Jeffrey's work September – November 2017. Jeffrey is an Iraq veteran who faced new challenges dealing with PTSD. His experiences led him to search

for a passionate and creative means of exploring his emotions, political beliefs, personal views of the world and psychological distress. He feels art is not meant to fix problems, but to make others aware they exist, so change, comfort and understanding can happen.

Jeffrey grew up in the Midwest and attended college in MN and WI where he studied sculpture. He decided to take a break

from college, and joined the US Army as a cavalry scout one week after 9/11. After serving in the US Army and being deployed to Iraq, he faced new challenges dealing with PTSD and was not sure what to do with his life.

He was fortunate to get back into art and start learning the medium of glass. His

interest in sculpture stems from his experiences as a soldier. He has a new appreciation for life and how he looks at it. Being wounded and dealing with the pains of combat (both mentally and physically) takes a toll on a person.

Creating art is an escape for Jeffrey. It is his outlet from within, from the confines of his own mind. The experiences he had in the military and particularly in Iraq, shaped who he has become as a man and as a person. He

doesn't always know how to interpret his thoughts and memories of these experiences in words, so his art becomes his medium.

Art has changed his life by giving him focus and helping him begin to heal from those life changing experiences. Learning how powerful art is and the impact it can have on a person's life has been the one reason he is here today, driving him to learn

more and to educate others.

Volunteer General Manager and Gift Shop Manager — Retiring

End of an era: Rodmans decide to retire from The Highground Excerpts from *Todd Schmidt, Clark County Press*

After nearly 19 years of service to The Highground Veterans Memorial Park, retirement time has come for volunteer general manager Kirk Rodman, 83, and his wife, Nancy, 74, volunteer gift shop manager. Their announcement came at the annual Friends of the Highground dinner held Feb. 25, 2017.

"It has been an awesome experience and privilege to serve here. Amazing to think about all the people we have met and the stories we have heard. You have no idea what people are carrying around with them."

In 1998, Kirk and Nancy came to the Highground as volunteers. "They asked me to serve as volunteer general manager while they looked for somebody," he said. "My original commitment was one year. I said I would follow-up as a member of the search committee when I left." Kirk said he had three conditions to take the position. They needed to put together 12 people on a board of directors, find a home for the Liberty Bell and take steps to build bridges back to the community. A group of former board members and interested persons convened on a Saturday in the basement of the former M&I (now BMO Harris) Bank basement. Kirk was excused from the room for about 30 minutes, and when he was asked back in, a board of directors was in place.

Nancy said about the only way The Highground could stay open then was with volunteers willing to donate their time. Because of their extensive backgrounds with JC Penney in the retail industry, they were naturals to beef up the gift shop operation. "Now the place looks like a store," Kirk said. "It does a lot of sales volume per square foot. As it grew, a lot of people pitched in to help."

Kirk and the Board of Directors continually pushed the concept that The Highground was not a war memorial park. You don't see any old tanks or airplanes sitting around. "We honor the service and sacrifice of our veterans," Kirk said. "Our mission is healing and education."

The Highground accommodates an estimated 150,000 visitors per year. Staffers send out 13,000 newsletters five times per year. People come from all over the world to visit The Highground. The guest register includes signatures from China, Australia and various places in Europe. "Many of these visitors get it and turn into evangelists for us," Rodman noted. "With their help and financial support, The Highground can continue its mission. Most people who contribute money don't dictate how it is to be used. They tell us to use it where we need it. Their faith in our staff is amazing."

Kirk said. "It is hard for The Highground to function in the winter months due to snow, ice and cold weather. The Welcome Center will feature a virtual tour of The Highground. The large room can also be used for meetings and community events." A POW lookout tower will be constructed in the front of the building. "That is so we don't forget who we are and what we are about," he said.





Editor's note: The Rodman's are not the type of managers that direct staff and sit back themselves without pitching in. Both gave tours to students, young and old or they just listened to visitors. Kirk spoke and worked at every stone ceremony, event, work days and fundraisers. He is a leader, a "peddler" (his label) and enjoyed recognizing and honoring veterans and their families. Him and Nancy enjoyed shaking hands with visitors and often reminded us that we never know when we are going to "touch" that one person who needs it. His stories will be repeated in hopes we can carry with us all they have taught us.






